SYMBOLS OF HOPE AND LIFE

What do eggs, beeswax and Easter have in common? A beautiful creation of pysanky (Ukrainian Easter eggs) by our Grade Three students. This wonderful and unique project has been a CCS tradition for over 20 years! Maybe you have one of these special eggs on display in your home.

First our young students use pencils to draw their designs, which are meant to tell the story of faith in God. Next, the children trace their drawings with a tool called a "kistka", which writes beeswax onto the egg. The egg is carefully dipped into a light coloured dye and patted dry. This process is repeated using a medium coloured dye and then a dark colour. All the wax is then removed (by helpful volunteers!) and a beautiful pysanka is revealed! (*con't on pg3*)

To bring you up to speed, here are some of the current ways that Calgary Christian Secondary School staff are using to connect with our students. Although relationship building is not the primary outcome of all of these events, they all provide an opportunity to strengthen the connection we have with our students:

Belize Trip 2018 - an annual excursion to central america to build structures, capacity, and relationships amongst students and Belizeans

Friday Morning Hockey - a weekly game of hockey amongst staff, students, and parents to build hockey skills and relationships amongst all those who play

Coaching - an ongoing investment into our students as they build physical, mental, and emotional skills and develop relationships outside school hours

Drama Production - an annual event designed to showcase creativity and to bolster connections amongst staff and students

Faith Formation - this year our focus has been sharing 'My Story' - an opportunity for honest life reflection that strengthens trust amongst staff and students

Classrooms - a daily intention to understand the unique, amazing story of each and every one of our students

It is through relationship that successes and failures become celebrated aspects of our journeys. Moments that should foster high fives, hugs, a listening ear, laughs, shared tissues, words of encouragement, and not just a double tap or swipe on a screen. A good relationship is where learning and confidence begin - they are worth our energy. Let's all continue to create the spaces needed for good relationship building and if you need something to consume, check out 'This Is Us'.

ACCESSIBILITY IMPROVEMENTS AT CCHS

When a middle school student, who relies on his wheelchair, expressed his deep desire to attend CCS for high school – just like his siblings had -- forces mobilized to address a long standing need in our facilities: accessibility. Now, thanks to a generous \$45,000 foundation grant, the CSCE Board has approved and prioritized the installation of a wheelchair lift and construction of additional accessible washrooms in our secondary school building. The project will provide access to all three levels of the building and be completed for the start of the 2018-19 school year – in time for this student to start his grade 10 year.

"This eliminates specific barriers within our school, and opens up new opportunities for our community to enjoy what CCS has to offer," said Executive Director Ken DeWyn. "Whether it's a student in a wheelchair, or an athlete on crutches, or a parent/grandparent with limited mobility, the lift will serve our community in many ways."

In addition to the purchase of the lift and build out of washrooms, the scope of work will include replacing door knobs with levers and automating entrance doors.

PYSANKY EGGS (CON'T)

Sharon Bolink, our current Grade Two teacher, has been leading this project for years with our students as it's a perfect tie-in to the Grade Three curriculum: studying Ukrainian Culture. "As a creation-enjoyer and beauty-creator, this vivid and colourful project brings me great delight! Each pysanka is meant to tell the story of Easter, so the symbols and colours are important. A circle symbolizes that God is infinite and He promises us everlasting life. The cross reminds us that Jesus died on the cross to pay for our sins. Many other symbols reflect the various names of our Messiah: Morning Star, Rose of Sharon, King of Kings... Seeing each unique pysanka, written with the story of Christ paying for all of our sins, and knowing we one day get to live in heaven with God, makes me marvel at God's great love for each of us (John 3:16). This very hands-on project, with colours and symbols, is a fantastic way to point out to my students that our great God loves them and that He wishes to give them eternal life with Him in heaven!"

Pysanky, are "the most beautiful Easter eggs of all. They are a symbol of hope and life, of spring's triumph over winter, and of God's endless love for all creatures, great and small."

MR. ABMA REMEMBERED

If you've been a part of the CCS community in any capacity since 1983, you will have interacted with Mr. Richard Abma, long-time teacher and CCS parent. In the 32 years he worked at CCS, Mr. Abma impacted the lives of hundreds of students and co-workers, as well as their families. Described by one alumnus as "one of those most influential teachers ... one who encouraged [his students] to think critically and deeply care about what [we] were learning", it is clear he has left his mark on the CCS community in a profoundly positive way.

In the fall of 2016, Mr. Abma was diagnosed with cancer. He fought his battle bravely, with the steady light and humor Richard is so well known for. Even in the last week of his life, he was able to laugh and poke fun at those who had the privilege of spending time with him. Richard Abma passed away early in the morning on January 17, 2018, leaving behind his wife Wendy, 5 children, two sons-in-law, one grandchild and many other loved ones. On January 27, Richard's friends, family, former students and colleagues filled the pews of River Park Church to celebrate his life and share memories.

Overwhelmingly, Richard is remembered as a man who loved the outdoors, enjoyed sports, lived his faith, taught with authority and kindness, was passionate about social justice and the environment, served with integrity and humility and had the most infectious sense of humour! It is evident that he was the same person with his family as he was in the classroom as he was in his role with the Justice Film Festival and so on. (con't)

"Mr. Abma played a huge role in my education and experience at CCS – from learning Social Studies to playing soccer with him as the coach, he was a firm and caring instructor and I have nothing but great memories," says Stephen Okanlawon, class of '14. Jeff Jones, class of '98, remembers, "Mr. Abma cared deeply for his students but he wasn't afraid to challenge them." Alumnus Chris Cramer, who also serves on the Maintenance team at CCS noted that "Richard appreciated the work we did to maintain the school and his classroom was neater than any of the other classrooms in the school." So many former students remember his laugh, his eclectic tie collection, the way he challenged each one to think and explore and appreciate the subjects he taught, the interest he took in his students and the influence he had on so many, lasting many, many years after graduation! Tayah (Dykema) McKenzie ('13) credits Mr. Abma's encouragement as one of the reasons she chose nursing as her profession today.

Even though Richard Abma can no longer teach students at the front of the classroom, or enjoy a weekend in the mountains or play a prank on a sibling, his memory will last and his influence will continue. One of his final words to friend and colleague, Hank Beeksma, is a beautiful motto that can apply to all of us who loved Richard: "Enjoy your friends. Enjoy your family. Enjoy creation. Enjoy God."

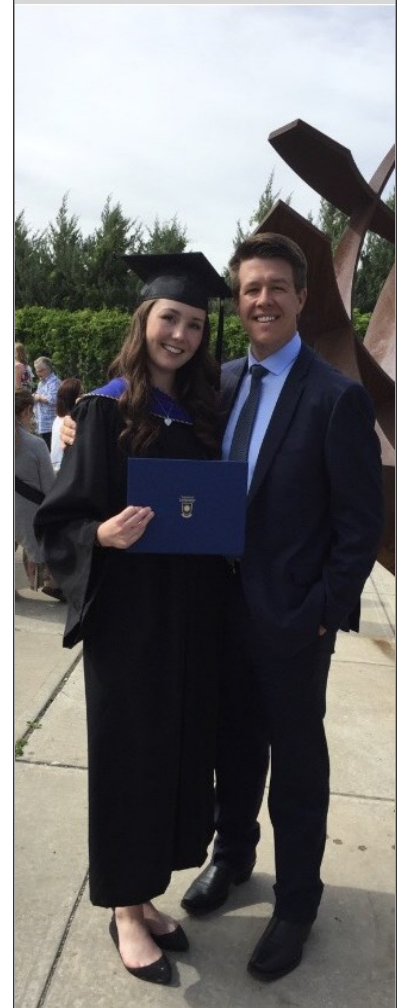

She was so kind and patient with us, and always encouraged us to be the best that we could be. She always took what 9 year olds said seriously, and treated us with respect. A task I have learned is very difficult. I will never forget her kindness and support.”

“I will also never forget Mr. Abma,” Tayah continues. “He was the kind of man that always challenged you to think bigger and broader. From him I learned how to think beyond my self and how my actions might affect the world. He was actually one of the first people to tell me to be a nurse, and that is a part of why I am one today.”

“CCS gives you the opportunity to make a close knit group of friends. The friends that I had in high school are still the ones that I hold most dear today. The community that you are able to develop at CCS is amazing. I was lucky enough to play sports and participate in some of the theatre productions. This allowed me to have a wide social circle and a community that I felt supported by day in and day out. A community that I still rely on in times of need. CCS, as a whole, shaped my approach to the world. It allowed me to enter the adult world with confidence, to know my value and my strengths. CCS gave me the foundation that my faith needed. To see other believers struggle yet still succeed, to be able to ask questions and feel lost without fear of judgement. My faith has also allowed me to excel at my job where I try to embody Christ with every patient, knowing that my actions and my caring make a large impact on how my patients feel. Nursing can be scary - emotionally and physically draining - and I need God to give me the strength to be calm and confident, and to get through every shift without burning out.”

Thank you for sharing your story, Tayah. Thanks for being the kind of nurse we would all want to have by our hospital bedside. Thanks for your tribute to CCS and the community that has set you up for the successes you are enjoying today, more than 4 years later!
